Social Action Committee Report – May 2025

Highlights from 2024-2025

Summer & Fall Social Action Survey at Services & kick-off Meeting set priority campaigns for the year: Support & Protect Immigrants, Support Democracy & Civil Rights, Climate Justice, followed by Reproductive Justice and LGBTQ Rights. Summer included Pride Shabbat, a documentary on Judaism and Reproductive Rights "Under G-d," and participation in the RAC-NY Climate Justice Campaign to win Climate Superfund Law.

We also responded to members' interest in learning more about the crisis in Israel and Gaza. Rabbi Paula taught a history of Israel class on Zoom "How did we get here?" Hebrew School parent Amy Feinstein, working with Rabbi Paula, continues to lead a monthly intergenerational discussion group on Israeli and Palestinian Peace and Solidarity.

Election Education & NYS ERA Support in the Fall & a successful Mitzvah Day on Jan. 12
After a NYCLU speaker on the ERA, reproductive and civil rights, members sent postcards at a joint HT/Beth Am party, at Kate Sussman's and at home for both Reclaiming Our Vote and in support of the NYS Equal Rights Amendment—which passed!

On Mitzvah Day Clothing was collected and distributed and care kits were assembled and sent with Uptown Wagon, the ziti was baked and delivered to the 181st St. fridge, books were sold for Middle East peace, pizza was eaten to support the Hebrew High school trip to D.C. Advocacy letters were written, Climate justice and Immigration reform seminars were attended, and our children created an art heart with loving kindness.

Supporting and Defending Immigrants, in the Winter and Spring

We reactivated our membership in the NYC Synagogue Coalition for the Immigration and Refugee Crisis, which led a workshop on Mitzvah Day. We attended a Forum on How Allies Can Take Action led by Sen. Robert Jackson in Feb. We are taking all that guidance into meeting with the two churches in our building and with local Public School Parent Associations. We want to make our building safer for immigrants and support migrant children who go to school with our Hebrew School students, and their parents. With Beth Am, we will be distributing "know your rights" cards for immigrants to local businesses. We will be educating & advocating for The NY for All Act and NY Access to Representation Act and the Federal Protecting Sensitive Locations Act.

The upcoming year 2025-26 will represent a transition of phases in the work of the Legacy Planning Committee (LPC), from gathering/organizing information & resources to implementation.

The committee has accomplished the following elements from the 04/18/24 Annual Report:

- completed the committee leadership survey process
- digestion of implicated actions from committee leadership survey -> task-planning
- creation of congregational survey
- digital scan of paper-based cemetery records for safe-keeping
- market-analysis to confirm our plot pricing remains accurate to the market (it is)
- created a cemetery workflow for ongoing reference for new & existing account inquiries
- finalized and supported the distribution of the congregational end-of-life planning survey
- committee analysis of the congregational survey producing a few focused recommendations

ONGOING/UPCOMING:

- Drive January 2026 end of life planning event in coordination with Rabbi Paula and the new annually elected leadership.
- Provide clarity and availability of resources to the congregation pertaining to Legacy Planning
- Completion of the transition from paper-based cemetery records onto a revised and easy to maintain digital records system toward standard utilization.
- Update to the members/staff on record to communicate with the Cedar Park Beth El Cemetery. A site visitation is planned for 4/25/25.

Building Committee Report – May 2025

A structural engineer has been hired to evaluate the current conditions of our building. After a preliminary inspection was conducted, a recommendation was made to hire a contractor to make several building probes. The good news is that the probes show that the building's structure is in sound condition. However, there are a number of facade and roofing issues that need to be addressed. With the assistance of building reps, a plan is being developed to address these issues with a phased approach. By the time you read this report, we should have received bids and be in the process of selecting / working with a contractor addressing the most critical items over the summer.

Although the heating season is over, we continue to work on making the system more efficient. We have managed to get several radiators operating again either by draining, releasing trapped air and or replacing steam traps. The circulation pumps for the boiler's condenser tank have been reconditioned which will also enhance our heating system. Still more work to be done but progress has been made.

Restoration is nearly complete on the most western set of main entry doors on 185th street. Progress photos that have been submitted indicate that the doors will look stunning when complete. We are hoping the doors will be installed by the congregational meeting so you can get a chance to admire them. Speaking of doors, the wooden vestibule door has been repaired facing immediately after the main temporary doors. We are in the process of sanding and applying a durable gloss paint on the Social Hall doors that will make it easier to maintain and continue looking in great condition.

The Social Hall floor as well as the back leading steps have been stripped and waxed, resulting in a huge improvement. We will attempt to maintain it in this condition. As time permits, we will tackle marble and terrazzo floors in other parts of the building.

Renovation is now complete on the ground floor bathroom adjacent to the kitchen and is accessible to all.

Composting is officially in effect at HT. Please assist our custodians with this earth-friendly and mandatory city requirement by disposing your food scraps in the clearly marked brown composting containers.

As summer approaches we will work on the ceiling and walls on the staircase that leads to the main office since there is less traffic in the building. While this project is ongoing you will be directed to a different door to enter the building.

Our hedges that surround our building need serious trimming. This is a huge undertaking and our limited custodian staff can use a big hand on this important project. We'd really appreciate your help. Please reach out at mkleinnyc@rcn to lend a hand.

Fundraising Committee – May 2025

First and foremost, we are very appreciative of our Leadership Circle donors, who have contributed \$5,000 or more in support of our community. This support has been essential in sustaining the synagogue and supporting its growth this past year. We likewise give our thanks to members who have given bequests. These contributions will help ensure that Hebrew Tabernacle remains a presence in Washington Heights for many years to come.

Our major fundraising campaign of the year took place last June for the renovation of the social hall. Thanks to the generosity of our community we were able to raise \$56,284 of our \$70,000 goal. Thanks to the hard work of the social hall renovation committee the cost of the renovation came in at \$48,284. Remaining funds will be applied toward the general operating budget.

Hebrew Tabernacle waived the High Holiday ticket requirement for newcomers for the first time last fall. This policy was a resounding success with increased donations. In addition to receiving \$2,000 more than the previous year, our open-door policy resulted in several new families joining the synagogue. Another fundraising highlight is Rita's exercise class, which brought in \$10,000 this past year & on track to continue next year. Other fundraisers include the Hanukkah Virtual Menorah and the Mishloach Manot campaign. The Mishloach Manot fundraiser resulted in free boxes distributed to every member of our community and \$180 being donated to the West Side Campaign Against Hunger. The Passover campaign raised funds to help subsidize the cost of the community seder and make it more affordable to participants. Two fundraisers were absent from our lineup this year. We discontinued the Honey from the Heart fundraiser and we did not hold a Rummage Sale.

We are mindful of the significant gap between the synagogue's income and operating expenses. We had \$432,000 in income in Fiscal Year 2023-2024, versus the \$562,000 budgeted in expenses for Fiscal Year 2024-2025. At the recent board meeting, Aaron proposed a quarterly meeting of members from the licensing, membership, finance, and fundraising committees to tackle this problem. We are beginning to think about fundraising for the next fiscal year and need your help.
